GIS in the Rockies 2003

ASPRS, along with four other geospatial societies, ACSM, GITA, PLSC and URISA, hosted the 16th Annual GIS in the Rockies Conference October 1-3 at the Plaza at the Mart in Denver. This year's theme "Geospatial Integration Today for Tomorrow" addressed the geospatial industry's unique blend of disciplines and topics. The highest ever number of abstracts submitted resulted in two informationpacked days of technical sessions and workshops.

The first day of the conference consisted of five workshops and six technical sessions plus the exhibition. Track themes included Introduction to GIS; Resource Management; Imagery and Remote Sensing; Engineering and Infrastructure; GPS and Field Data and the GIS Vendor Showcase. Fiftyseven vendor booths provided excellent contact opportunities for attendees and exhibitors alike. Peter Batty, Chief Technical Officer of Ten Sails, presented the luncheon audience with his unique insight into several of the latest GIS technologies. This was the first year the exhibit hall was closed during lunch and the exhibitors appreciated the break. They also liked getting to hear the luncheon speakers. The evening social in the vendor area closed out the day's activities. Drawings were held for 30 door prizes, including a Hewlett-Packard iPag loaded with ESRI's ArcPad 6. Day two offered five workshops and five concurrent technical sessions plus the exhibition. The track themes were Public Policy and Administration: GIS for Homeland Security; Emerging Technologies, Education and Career Development and Software and Integration. John J. Hansen, the Secretary of Technology for the State of Colorado, informed the crowd at the sitdown luncheon about the importance of

collaboration and the issue of GIS accuracy. This year's new format offered a third day filled with firstrate technical tours at **DigitalGlobe**, **Jeppesen**, the **USGS Mapping Center** and the **BP Center for Visualization**. ASPRS was proud to sponsor the refreshments offered at the end of each tour. Over 100 people attended the technical tours with a great time had by all. The annual GIS in the Rockies golf tournament at Buffalo Run on Friday afternoon gave several hackers the opportunity to navigate the course using on-cart GPS units.

Overall, attendance was close to 600 people. This is down somewhat from previous years; however the core attendance (non-vendor attendees) was up from 2002. This is considered a good turnout, seeing that most 2003 conferences have recorded a 20% or more drop in attendance. Many of the exhibitors rated the conference higher than other regional conferences, and over 90% of those who completed the exhibitor evaluation form said they are interested in exhibiting again next year. Thanks to all ASPRS volunteers for your hard work!

GIS in the Rockies: Report on Technical Tours

The 2003 GIS in the Rockies conference presented a different twist than previous years. Instead of workshops and technical sessions, the third day of the conference offered up four technical tours at **DigitalGlobe**, **Jeppesen**, the **USGS Mapping Center** and the **BP Center for Visualization**, exclusively for GIS in the Rockies attendees. ASPRS sponsored the refreshments offered at each tour for the over 100 attendees.

DigitalGlobe provided a very interesting and wellorganized tour of their facility. Several staff members gave the visitors a look at the process of filling a data order, from taking the order itself through data acquisition and delivery of the final product to the customer. A highlight of the tour was the visit to the Space Operations Department or "Mission Control" Center. Here staff track the imaging satellites in real-time as they orbit earth. Another treat was taking a world-wide tour by viewing **DigitalGlobe** imagery from various sites around the globe, all in the comfort of their conference viewing room.

Jeppesen began their event with refreshments sponsored by ASPRS during a presentation on the company and their GIS related activities. This was followed by a tour of the facility, emphasizing how GIS and image and elevation data are used in their daily operations. This tour provided a rare insight into how GIS is utilized in aviation and aviation mapping, including airport transportation logistics

modeling and airport take-off and landing visuals for pilots.

At USGS, the group of 45 attendees was first walked through the expansive map warehouse to see how the Map Services division handles and stores the thousands of maps ordered and shipped every day a very impressive facility. Then everyone was split into several groups and shown different aspects of the Rocky Mountain Mapping Center's research and operations, including the creation of DEMs, orthophotos and the use of remote sensing data to map land cover use and change in urban areas. The staff at the USGS showed us all their exceptional hospitality and expertise.

The **BP Center for Visualization** tour began with an introduction by the facility staff and a brief explanation of the history of the center. The **BP Center** was established in 2000 with funds from British Petroleum as a means to provide an immersive virtual reality experience allowing engineers and scientists to virtually explore underground spaces to access drilling opportunities and anticipate problems. Following the introduction, the group of 29 was lead into the virtual reality chamber or "cave" to experience the 3-dimensional computer simulations for themselves. Special battery-powered, 3-D glasses were worn so the computers could track the wearers' position in the space and adjust the views accordingly. After many oohs, ahs and ducking to avoid virtual objects, every person left the tour with a smile on their face and a story to tell. _____
